he term Christians boy brings two images to mind: the student in the smart black blazer; the sportsman in the black, yellow and red jersey. Declan Barry, who joined CBC in 2002 at four years of age, has worn both with distinction.

When the results of the Leaving Cert were announced in late August, word of Declan's success spread quickly. The teachers in the Preparatory School, where Declan spent the eight years of his primary school education, were delighted with the outcome. They remembered him as a friendly, hard working

At last month's Awards Evening, Declan was presented with the Brother Reynolds Student of the Year Award. This award is presented each year to a young man who serves as a role model for others in the school; who met the challenges of school life with courage, resilience and dignity, who took advantage of the opportunities afforded to him by CBC and who possesses the traits that the College seeks to foster in all its pupils.

Declan was also awarded joint First Place in Leaving Cert, sharing the honour with Rory Doyle and Colm Power, both on 7A1 grades.

He was also awarded a prestigious Naughton Scholarship valued at €20,000 (see picture below) for excellence in Maths and Science, in addition to an entrance scholarship to UCC.

Strategic Development Plan Progress Report

mmediately on taking office in October 2014, the new Board of Management determined that its main focus would be on a major refurbishment and redevelopment of the entire CBC campus, including the Preparatory School, the Secondary School, the grounds at Sidney Hill and the sports pavilion and grounds at Lansdowne.



The Board's objective is to bring all College facilities up to a level which will provide the best educational environment for CBC pupils for the next 25 years. To this end, the Board set up a Strategic Development Committee to plan and implement a programme of development and modernisation.

The Committee met for the first time in January 2015 and set about drawing up a Strategic Development Plan. All the CBC stakeholders were invited to make contributions to the planning process, including teachers, pupils, parents, and members of the Past Pupils Union. Professional help was provided by consulting engineers Arup, and architects O'Donnell and Tuomey.

During the early months of 2015, fortuitously, a large property on Patrick's Hill, adjoining CBC, came on the market. It consisted of a large house called 'Edmonton' with a half acre site attached. CBC purchased the property and it

became, literally, the cornerstone of the proposed new developments.

The Strategic Development Plan was presented to the Board on 5 May 2015. The Trusstees and Board accepted it and agreed to move it on to the next stage. This involved seeking advice from O'Donnell and Tuomey

on how the plan could be turned into bricks and mortar.

Significant progress has been made and detailed planning will follow as soon as the Department of Education and Skills clarify the amount in funding they are prepared to make available for the project.

School Tours

The following day, Monday, was entirely spent at Disneyland Paris. There, the group met with Mr Christophe Murphy, Senior Vice-President of Disneyland Paris who is a past pupil of CBC!

Transition Year Lillehammer Ski Tour

The Transition Year ski trip has been an annual event for many years. The numbers taking part have been steadily rising. The 2015-16 tour involved 90 pupils.

The departure from Wellington Road on day one was at 6.30am. The destination, Lillehammer, Norway, home to the 1994 Winter Olympics, was not reached until that evening.

The week of ski school that followed was, for many of the participants, the most memorable time of their lives to date. Evenings were almost as exciting with activities such as tobogganing and swimming early in the week and museums and cinema later as tiredness took its toll.

The 12 hour return trip to Wellington Road was endured as a small price for the experience.

Transition Year Play: The Plough and the Stars

Mr Trevor Hussey is noted in CBC and beyond for his ambitious dramatic productions. Transition Year in CBC endeavours to give all pupils an opportunity to explore educational experiences outside of what is made available by the normal curriculum. A process of symbiosis between Mr Hussey and Transition year has resulted in a remarkable series of professional quality dramas being staged in the College year after year.

What is more remarkable is that, for Mr Hussey, the play is a secondary matter. It is a vehicle for getting every Transition Year pupil involved in an area that develops both his talents and his character. There are many roles apart from acting involved in these projects: directing, stage managing, lighting, scenery, publicity, box office, pub-

lic relations and so on.

This year's play was Sean O'Casey's *The Plough and the Stars*. It was a very appropriate choice for the year of celebration of the 1916 Rising, and it fitted in very well with other commemorative events organised in the College.

The characters of *The Plough* are so clearly defined by O'Casey that actors trying out for the first time have a sporting chance of getting it right, of being recognisable in roles, such as Captain Brennan, the Young Covey, Clitheroe, Nora, Bessie Burgess and Mrs Grogan.

It is clear also that O'Casey does not romanticise war, or gloss over complications such as the differences between the Citizen Army and the Irish Volunteers, the rich and the poor.



CBC are All-Ireland Maths Champions

In the classroom or on the sporting field, the lads of Christian Brothers College on Sidney Hill have proved themselves among the elite in Ireland in recent weeks.

Teacher Donal O'Mahony led the troops into battle at the National University of Ireland Galway (NUIG) last weekend for the All-Ireland mathematics competition, and pupils Barry Galvin, Robert Daly, Tao Yu and Conall Williamson came up trumps, beating 13 other teams to take the George Boole Trophy and become All-Ireland champions

Mr O'Mahony said the entire school had contributed to the success, hailing all the teachers involved in maths, including one of their all-time great academic students, Alan O'Regan, who had the highest marks in Ireland in honours maths the year he did the Leaving Certificate exams. Mr O'Regan is back in CBC teaching maths for his PME

Mr O'Mahony said 'They are very good lads with great character.

'They worked very hard, coming early to school to prepare for the competition.

'We try to get it across to the lads that the more they work at different things, the more successful they will be.

'The win is recognition for pupils and staff who put the work in.'

When Mr O'Mahony is not coaching maths, he can be found coaching CBC's Harty Cup hurling team.

CBC: National Winner of Charlemagne Youth Prize

Mr David O'Connell accepted the award for National Winner of the European Charlemagne Youth Prize earlier this year, from European President Mr Martin Schulz (pictured below), on behalf of CBC, at Aachen, Germany. One project was nominated by each of the 28 national national juries, representing each of the countries in the European Union. Projects run by 16 to 30 year olds, which provided models for young people living in Europe, qualified for entry in the competition.

The project had its roots in a Transition Year politics module, introduced for the first time this year. Christians has always had a great tradition of past pupils who have served in public office, both locally and nationally and now on the European stage. Consequently, it was not difficult to engage their interest in the topic of government.

The module afforded the students the opportunity to visit the E u r o p e a n Parliament in Brussels and to meet Mrs Deirdre Clune MEP. This trip gave them an opportunity to see the workings of the Parliament at close quarters.

Of course

the project was not all work. Eighteen Transition Year pupils, accompanied by Principal Dr Larry Jordan and three teachers, set off on a fact finding (and fun) mission to Europe in late February, visiting three great

cities: Paris, Brussels and London. This experience was a big help to the project.

Winning the Irish section of the Charlemagne Youth Prize was an honour for CBC and the presentation of the award by the President of the European Union certainly added great prestige to the prize.



Science Olympiad

The European Union Science Olympiad (EUSO) is a practical team competition for EU second level science students. Estonia was selected as the host country for the 2016 event.

Tommy Cornally of Fifth Year was invited to try out for a place in the Irish Olympiad team because he had achieved excellent results in his Junior Cert maths and science exams.

For the first stage of the selection process, Tommy had to sit an exam in Dublin City University. The results enabled the judges to whittle down the number of can-

didates to a group of twelve, which included Tommy. This group had to undertake a practical exam in the DCU laboratories over a two day period. Half were selected and Tommy was delighted to be included among the successful ones. The group of six was divided into two teams each made up of a biologist, a chemist and a physicist. The competition would require them to pool their resources by cooperating on a number of projects.

The Olympiad itself was held during the second week in May. Two practical tasks were given to the teams: cheese manufacturing on the Monday and, on Wednesday, the manufacture of batteries including work on a microbial cell battery. The biologist, physicist and the chemist

had to use their specific skill sets to complete the tasks.

During the other days of the week, the teams were brought on various excursions throughout Estonia. These outings included a hike through an Estonian bog, fishing on one of Estonia's largest lakes and a guided tour of old Tallinn town.

At the closing ceremony at the end of the week, gold, silver and bronze medals were given out. Both Irish teams were awarded silver medals, which was Ireland's best performance in recent years.

Tommy was the fifth pupil to be selected from CBC for the European Union Science Olympiad. The greatest number of any school in the country.

Smoothing the Way

A Unique Style of First Year Management

or First Year Head Mrs Anne Long, the school year 2016-17 is significant. It is her sixth year in the role, therefore, every boy in the school has experienced her benevolent brand of discipline/pastoral care. Under her management, First Year pupils, housed in their own separate building, adjust and adapt and, in the course of a year, are assimilated into CBC.

First Year pupils, straight out of primary school, and used to having only one teacher, can find secondary school a rather daunting experience. However, in CBC, Mrs Long is in the First Year building all day. She arrives before the pupils in the morning and is there until after they go home in the evening; and she supervises the breaks! It is very reassuring for pupils to have a point of contact, to know that someone knows their name.

Many minor matters can ruin a child's day: misplaced blazers, forgotten ties, lost bus money, knees in need of plasters, lunches left at home. Mrs Long sorts these on a daily basis.

For parents too, Mrs Long is a 'one stop shop'. By mid-term, she knows all the boys in her charge. Parents are able to phone her or meet her informally in her office to discuss any worries they might have regarding their son settling in the school.

One of her most important jobs is to monitor the academic performance of all First Year pupils. Because of her daily presence in the First Year area, she is in constant communication with all the First Year teachers. Difficulties can often be resolved by a chat with the teacher, encouragement to the pupil and, perhaps, a phone call home to the parents.

Spiritual development is an important focus in CBC, as in all ERST schools. Every year Mrs Long accompanies the whole First Year cohort on a trip to the Edmund Rice Centre, Mount Sion, Waterford: the resting place of Blessed Edmund Rice. This visit is always a source of inspiration and encouragement and impacts on the daily life of the boys.

The Union very much appreciates the encouragement which it receives from Dr Larry Jordan and the Board of Management to maintain an active role in the development of the College.



The focus on this event stimulated an interest in history in general. Many of the pupils were surprised to learn that Christian Brothers College is older than the state, founded as it was in the 1840s.

Every pupil from Third to Sixth Class was involved in researching either an individual or group project.

Favourite themes for individual projects were biographies of a chosen 1916 leader, while creating replicas of the GPO was the popular choice for group projects. Models of the famous portico were manufactured in wood, plaster, cardboard, lego, plasticine and paper.

The highlight of the celebrations in CBC was a visit from the Army. Third Class took the opportunity to show some of their work to the visitors. During a special ceremony in the Hall, a tricolour was presented to the school. The boys were also given a talk on the significance of the national flag.

Later, the tricolour was raised on the Prep flagpole and the national anthem was sung.

Pitch and Putt

A Return to Harty Cup Hurling



The Year 2016 was an historic one for hurling in CBC: Christians re-entered the Dr Harty Cup, the top hurling competition in Munster, after a break of 97 years!

CBC were drawn in a group with Clonmel High School, St Flannan's College and Castletroy College. The top two would qualify for the semi-final of the competition.

In the run-up to the competitive matches, CBC defeated Youghal, North Mon AG and Blackwater College, raising team confidence. Clonmel was dispatched with difficulty in the first Harty Cup match. In the second match, CBC managed to defeat the famed hurling school, St Flannan's, knocking them out of the competition. Christians were now a force to be reckoned with. The final match in the league section was against Castletroy and CBC made it three wins out of three and topped the group.

In the knockout stage of the competition, CBC's journey came to an end with a defeat by St Coleman's College, Fermoy. However, the campaign has shown that hurl-

ing is alive and well in CBC.

CBC also fielded teams at U-15, U-16 and U-16½ levels. Robert Downey, Ben Keohane and Eoin Moloney were selected for the Cork Minor Hurling Team.

Once again, this year, 2016-17, CBC has already qualified for the quarter finals of the Harty Cup which takes place in January 2017. CBC Senior Hurling team defeated Rochestown College in the last 16 playoff. CBC U-16½ hurlers are also through to a Munster final.

CBC Tops Senior Cup Table after 29th Win

his year's Senior Cup final was played on Sunday 13 March in Musgrave Park: CBC v Crescent College. The game was impossible to call, right up to the final whistle. It ended with a score of nine points to eight, with Christians taking the cup for the 29th time.

The win provided a much coveted Senior Cup medal for each member of the squad, a trophy for the school and more. It was a reassurance that belief and unrelenting effort, sustained to the end, brings success. It confirmed that we are still *Mighty*, *Mighty Christians*.

This team is an important link in the chain of victories that stretches back to the first cup match in 1909 and to a rugby tradition that stretches back even farther. The team has a special place in CBC history because it restored the school to the top of the table of Senior Cup wins; a position that involved over a century of endeavour, and twenty-nine cup day wins.

The Bowen Shield final was a different affair, with wind and rain and the more physical Bandon side. However, clever tactics and a couple of breakaway tries tilted the game in CBC's favour and the final score was an impressive 23 points to CBC to Bandon's 10 points.
